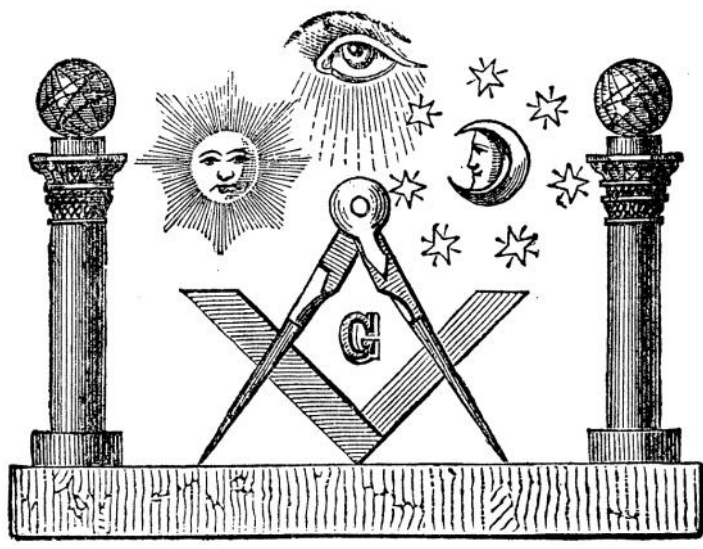

The Oblong Square in Freemasonry



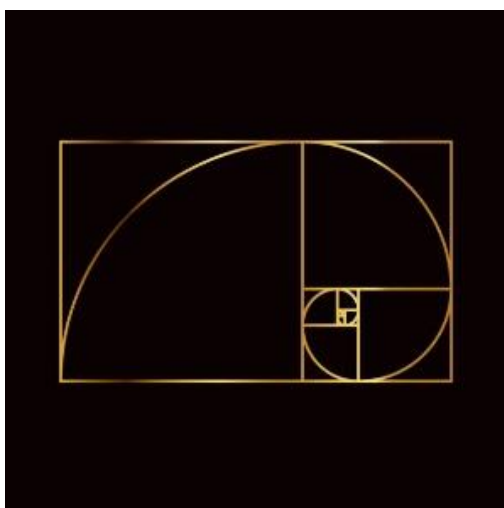

In Freemasonry, the oblong square is often used to represent the Masonic Lodge or the world itself, and it's a significant symbol in their rituals. The oblong square is said to find its prototype in various ancient structures, like the Ark of Noah and the Temple of Solomon.

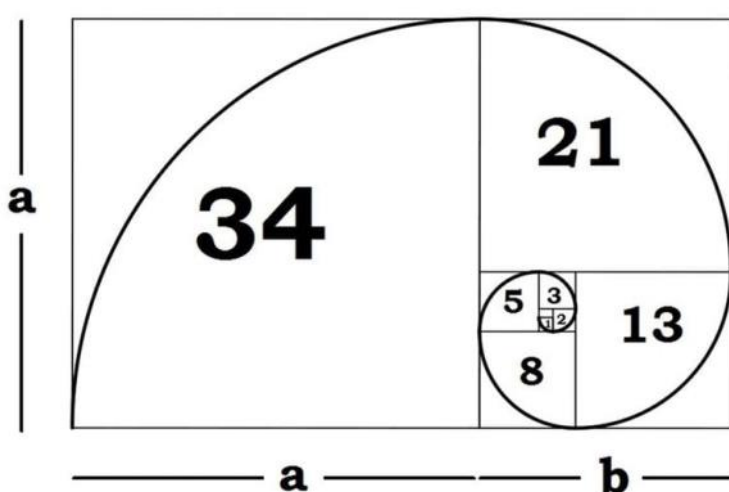
How can a square be long, without turning that square into a rectangle? Such would be the rational reaction of an uninitiated. The oblong square implies precisely the esoteric character of the geometric figure in question.

The oblong square assumes that the square is in extension. The square becomes an initiatory geometry, an illuminating cosmogony. This is why the oblong square is drawn at the opening of the works and erased at their closing. The oblong square is the symbolic space embodied by the tracing board.

The oblong square also recalls the square, symbol of the venerable master of the lodge. Another long square can be built on the golden section. This is the rectangle obtained by using the circle whose radius corresponds to the line connecting the middle of the side of the square at the opposite angle. This oblong square is called "sun square", the golden number being the solar dimension of any plot. As for the lunar square, it corresponds to the double square whose diagonal will divide the base.



Without wanting to enter into complicated mathematical considerations, it is interesting to underline here that the two solar and lunar squares both lead to the golden ratio (1.61803..)



The lunar appeals to us because it reveals the 5/3 ratio, which are the two numbers of the Entered Apprentice and the Fellowcraft. Numbers which establish the succession of the three degrees:
3 = Entered Apprentice, 5 = Fellowcraft, 7 and + = Master Mason.

We can also consider that the two squares, the lunar and solar, both contain the gold ratio and are identical in their symbolism.

The oblong square is therefore first a symbol of the center and, as such, can be represented in the form of the circle inscribed in the square, thus representing in the simplest way the temple whose center is the holy of holies, the circle of the spiritualized manifestation, conscientious. And this representation also makes us think of the circle and the two parallels used in different rituals to symbolize the course of the sun and the two gates of the year: the summer solstice and the winter solstice.



The Barefoot Mailman

It is important that we as Freemasons in West Palm Beach and from Harmonia Lodge No.138 remember the stories and the routes of the Barefoot Mailman as the routes were walked just 9 years prior to our Lodge and continued to just 2 years before the chartering of our Lodge. The Star Route was carried by the barefoot mailman from West Palm Beach to Miami. The round trip took 6 days and covered 138 miles. On the 7th day the carrier rested, and then the next day he started all over again. Prior to the Barefoot Mailman, it took a letter 3 months to reach West Palm Beach, as it would be taken to Key West by boat, then to Havana, then New York, and then back to Titusville where it would be brought to the Palm Beaches by boat. There were no roads. There was a total of 11 Carriers during this time period. They needed to be in good physical shape, able to swim, and know a little about the outdoors, camping, and fishing.

Carriers would need to weather hot sun, torrential rains and storms, mosquitoes, no see Ems, poisonous snakes, alligators, panthers and bears. The salary was \$600.00 annually and sometimes they would take someone traveling north or south and get an extra \$10.00 for guide service.

A typical trip began on Monday from Palm Beach in a small boat down Lake Worth to the Boynton Inlet. The carrier would walk 5 miles and spend the first night at the Orange Grove Refuge House in Delray which had been built for shipwrecked sailors. Tuesday the carrier would walk 7 miles to the Hillsboro Inlet, cross in a small boat that was there for that purpose and was kept hidden, continue walking for 18 miles to Ft. Lauderdale and spend another night at the New River House of refuge. Eleven houses of Refuge had been built on the coast for shipwrecked sailors. On Wednesday he would row 4 miles down the New River to the inlet, walk 4 miles to the top of Key Biscayne, and if conditions were right, he would sail, if not he would row and reach Miami Wednesday Night. Thursday he would start the trip north and return to Palm Beach Saturday night. In total he would travel 80 miles on foot, and 56 miles by boat. To prevent fatigue, the carriers developed a peculiar walk on the hard packed sand near the water's edge. Heading South, the right foot moved more quickly than the left, Heading North the left foot moved more quickly. They would tie their shoes together and carry them over their shoulder along with a lightweight canvas mailbag used just by the Barefoot Mailmen. They also carried a small haversack which held hard biscuits, salt pork, a small frying pan, coffee, a tin cup and some matches. They would supplement their diets with fish, small animals, wild oranges, bananas, and occasionally turtle eggs. Grape leaves made fine dishes along the way. In 1887, October 9th, on a Sunday, 35-year-old James H. Hamilton, Star Route Carrier from Trigs County Kentucky was not feeling well and someone mentioned he should delay his trip. He took a bottle of Perry-Davis Pain Killer with him and started his route on time. He never reached the first stop, the Orange Grove House of Refuge. It was reported a week later he had never reached it. His clothes and Mail Bag were found hanging from a tree near where the boat was hidden, the boat was gone, and his underclothes were found on the ground near the waters. There were rumors of hunters in the area. Some believe that he found the boat missing and swam across and was never heard of. His friends found a jawbone with a gold filling and concluded James had been eaten by Alligators.

The Barefoot Mailman route continued until a crude road was built below Palm Beach to Miami in 1893. This allowed mail to be carried overland by road. The Flagler Railroad would be in service in just a few years. Now in modern days, we see in the news that the UPS trucks are getting Air conditioning in 2023.

The Murdered Magicians, the Templars, and the Myths

by Peter Partner, Copyright 1987 (180 pages)

The author begins by recounting the Templar beginning to their demise. He is factual and his bibliography supports his words. He supports with facts and gives the reader a smooth read. Peter Partner, the Author, gives dates, the crusades, battles, forts in the Middle East and castles built or maintained by the Templars. He discusses politics, religion, and military concerns with the Templars. He points out that they were a military organization under the auspices of the Pope, and the Catholic Church. They did not have a political agenda and that the Politics of the French, Phillip the Faire would lead to their downfall.

In the second part of the book on Myths, Partner goes on to detail the offspring of the Templars organization "Magic." During the Middle Ages there was alchemy, those believing they could make gold, with the use of the "Philosophers Stone." Lodges with Temple origins became false organizations out of greed and power. Templar Myths were part of the downfall; this was what the Church and the French Government used to bring Heresy against the Templars. The Myths also provided some of the symbols and allegory that came through the false lodges and into our present-day Freemasonry but also expels the falsehoods and false beliefs of Freemasonry. The author also shows that the falsehoods written by "False Prophets" used the falsehoods and myths with Allegory and symbolism of the Templars to succeed financially and through political favoritism.



Our actions and appearance are the only Masonic creed some will ever see. You represent Masonry everyday in your actions and character. People watch us as Masons and may put us to the test even without us realizing it! Always be diligent, whether it be at the theater, restaurant, grocery, service station or just driving in traffic.
